

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INTRODUCTION

The UN Convention on the Rights of the Child is a part of the Annex I of the Dayton Peace Accords and, as all other conventions ratified by BiH, it has priority in enforcement over the national legislation¹, because it has the power of a constitutional norm.

In addition, Bosnia and Herzegovina has also become signatory to the following two optional protocols to the Convention on the Rights of the Child in 2000, namely: Optional Protocol on the involvement of children in armed conflict and Optional Protocol on the sale of children, child prostitution and child pornography, and the country has also signed the Millennium Declaration.

In 2012, Bosnia and Herzegovina concluded the procedure of accession to the following Conventions:

1. Council of Europe Convention on the Protection of Children against Sexual Exploitation and Sexual Abuse;
2. Council of Europe Convention on Contact concerning Children;
3. Convention on the International Recovery of Child Support and Other Forms of Family Maintenance (The Hague Convention).

The BiH Presidency held its 24th regular session on 25 June 2012 and rendered the decision on ratification of three aforementioned Conventions (Official Gazette of BiH/International treaties No. 11/12).

The first two aforementioned Conventions entered into force in Bosnia and Herzegovina on 1 March 2013, and the third one entered in force on 2 February 2013.

In the forthcoming period, Bosnia and Herzegovina should access the process of signing and ratifying the Optional Protocol to the Convention on the Rights of the Child on a Communications Procedure.

The initial report on the implementation of the Convention on the rights of the Child was presented to the Committee for the Rights of the Child in May 2005, and the Committee thereafter issued the Recommendations. With a view of implementing the Recommendations, the Council for Children started numerous activities.

A consolidated second to fourth periodic report of Bosnia and Herzegovina on the implementation of the Convention on the Rights of the Child was submitted to the relevant Committee in February 2010 (Presentation of the report before the Committee was held on 19 September 2012, and thereafter, the Committee sent the Recommendations to BiH.) The BiH Council of Ministers sent (2013) the Committee's Recommendations to the Entity, District and Cantonal Governments for their respective actions.

Reports of Bosnia and Herzegovina on the implementation of two Optional Protocols, as follows: the Optional Protocol to the Convention on the Rights of the Child on the Sale of Children, Child Prostitution and Child Pornography and the initial report on grounds of Article 8(1) of the Optional Protocol to the Convention on the Rights of Children regarding the Involvement of Children in Armed Conflicts were sent to the Committee in July 2008 and presented on 16 September 2010. The Committee's Recommendations were sent to Bosnia and Herzegovina and they were incorporated to the Action Plan for Children in Bosnia and Herzegovina (2011 – 2014).

Bosnia and Herzegovina has the duty to submit the reports on the implementation of the Convention of the Rights of the Child, to Optional Protocols to the Convention and realization of the Recommendations on a five-year basis.

In line with the ratified Council of Europe Convention, the report on the implementation of the Convention was developed in the first half of 2014 based on the questionnaire prepared by the Committee (adopted at the 95th session of the Council of Ministers held on 20 May 2014) and submitted

to Lanzarote Committee.

In order to implement the Convention on the Rights of the Child (BiH took it over by succession in 1993) and to meet the UN Millennium Development Goals, the Council of Ministers of Bosnia and Herzegovina approved (in July 2002) the Action Plan for Children of BiH 2002 – 2010 with a view to strengthening the position of children in BiH.

With a view of realizing the goals of the Action Plan for Children 2002-2010, the focus was placed on several areas which are particularly significant to the position of children in BiH, as well as on priorities for the protection of children: economic growth, judiciary and law revision, children in contact with the law, health, education, social welfare, protection of children against landmines and other forms of child protection.

The report on the implementation of the Action Plan was developed which was adopted by the Council of Ministers of BiH at its 154th session held on 29 June 2011.

As continuation of the undertaken activities, the BiH Council of Ministers (at 155th session held on 13 July 2011) adopted the Action Plan for Children of BiH 2011 – 2014 (hereinafter referred to as: the Action Plan).

The goal of the Action Plan was to define priority goals and measures that need to be taken between 2011 and 2014 in order to create the most favorable living conditions for children and families, their healthy mental and physical development, social inclusion and participation in decision-making processes, all in the best interest of children.


The report on the Action Plan implementation was developed for the period of July 2011 to May 2013 (adopted at 62nd session of BiH Council of Ministers held on 3 September 2013). In line with their powers, members of the Council for Children of BiH sent the necessary information relative to the implementation of objectives and measures set out in the Action Plan for the period from May 2013 to September 2014.

Based on the initial report and information obtained in further implementation of the Action Plan, an extensive report relative to the implementation of the Action Plan 2011 – 2014 was developed along with an assessment of the scope in which each specific measure was implemented.

The analytical report on the implementation of the Action Plan 2011 – 2014, as developed on the basis of the scope to which the measures were realized, was adopted at 117th session of the BiH Council of Ministers held on 12 January 2015.

The basis for the development of this third Action Plan for Children of BiH 2015 – 2018 (hereinafter referred to as: the Action Plan) is found in specifically determined recommendations of the Committee for the Rights of the Child, as well as in the activities with the poorest results achieved during the implementation of the previous Action Plan measures. In addition to the aforementioned, relevant UN and European international bodies' documents relative to the protection of children rights and their families were taken into consideration.

Considering the highly fragmented administrative system in BiH, this Action Plan, as the previous one, advocates a multidisciplinary approach and engagement of all the capacities within the society to develop well thought-out actions to improve living conditions in the interest of child development, which is a prerequisite to improve the status of children in Bosnia and Herzegovina.



II METHODOLOGY

The methodology of the Action Plan is task oriented in order to exercise the rights of children in BIH in accordance with assumed international obligations, primarily the Convention on the Rights of the Child and specifically determined recommendations of the Committee for the Rights of the Child. In addition to the Convention on the Rights of the Child, other relevant UN and European international bodies' documents relative to the protection of children rights and their families were taken into consideration.

The methodology of the Action Plan is based on the analysis of the situation and identification of the problems identified in the concluding observations and recommendations of the Committee of the Rights of the Child on the consolidated second to fourth periodic reports of Bosnia and Herzegovina on the implementation of the Convention on the Rights of the Child, as well as recommendations of other relevant UN and European international bodies relative to the protection of children rights and their families.

Pursuant to the conclusion reached at 117th session of the BIH Council of Ministers held on 12 January 2015, special attention was paid to the circumstances that led to the failure to implement the measures set out in the previous Action Plan, which pertained to financing – creating conditions for the realization of the plan, collection of data and other indicators and planning, training and creation of local resources so that those measures be proposed again or incorporated into other measures for the given areas of this Action Plan.

The development of the Action Plan was led by the Council for Children of Bosnia and Herzegovina as a cross-sectoral expert advisory and coordinating body of the BIH Council of Ministers within the Ministry of Human Rights and Refugees of BIH, tasked with, among other things, to develop a draft of the new Action Plan in order to continue the activities after 2014.

After the Action Plan was drafted, a public debate was conducted with relevant institutions and non-governmental sector in charge of promotion and protection of children rights in BIH for the purpose of additional consultations for the final draft of this document.

Promotion and protection of children rights, initiating and active participation in the development and monitoring of strategic, planning and action documents in the area of children rights in BIH, establishment of cooperation and coordination between all Action Plan implementation agencies falls under the jurisdiction, scope of work and responsibility of the Council for Children of Bosnia and Herzegovina.

The methodology of defining the goals and objectives of the Action Plan encompasses the evaluation of the previous Action plan realization (2011 – 2014) and evaluation of situation in the area of protection of human rights of children in Bosnia and Herzegovina.

III ASSESSMENT OF THE REALIZATION OF THE ACTION PLAN FOR CHILDREN IN BIH 2011 – 2014

The goal of the Action Plan was to define priority goals and measures that need to be taken between 2011 and 2014 in order to create the most favorable living conditions for children and families, their healthy mental and physical development, social inclusion and participation in decision-making processes, all in the best interest of children.⁹⁷ measures were proposed with a view of implementing the defined priority goals.

The analytical report on the implementation of the Action Plan for Children in BIH in 2011 – 2014, reads that 23 measures were fully implemented, 23 other measures were implemented in a major part, and 40 measures were implemented in part while 11 measures were not at all implemented.

A percentage of success achieved in the implementation of measures set forth in the Action Plan (the measures implemented in their entirety and in major part) is the following:

- 68,18% in the implementation of the measures in the area of health care
- 66,66% in the implementation of the measures pertaining to reporting and coordination
- 60% in the implementation of the objectives of the Action plan
- 47,05% in the implementation of the measures in the area of education
- 46,66% in the implementation of the measures in the area of social welfare
- 42,10% in the implementation of the measures in the area of other forms of protection – special protection of children
- 33,33% in the implementation of the measures in the area of vulnerable groups.



IV ASSESSMENT OF THE SITUATION IN THE AREA OF PROTECTION OF HUMAN RIGHTS OF CHILDREN IN BIH

Having reviewed the conducted activities within the Action Plan 2011 – 2014, and pursuant to the indicators of the scope in which set goals and measures were realized, the need is identified to continue further activities aimed at enhancement of human rights of children in Bosnia and Herzegovina.

With respect to the need for a continuous accession to new international conventions and protocols, and bearing in mind the recommendations of the Committee on the Rights of the Child, Bosnia and Herzegovina has to continue with the harmonization of laws, in particular in the area of criminal legislation.

In the area of healthcare for children, further implementation of measures is necessary in order to enhance the quality and availability of health services for children, pregnant women and childbearing women, and measures to enhance nurturing of the mother and child, more extensive health care with impaired children, better protection of children from infectious diseases, implementation of special health measures to Roma children.

In the area of education, the improvement is still needed in the implementation of framework laws on primary and secondary education, measures for the prevention of discrimination, and particularly measures for the inclusion of Roma children at all education levels.

In the area of children social protection, it is necessary to continue the implementation of measures to enhance the availability and quality of social and children protection especially in non-institutional care for children and better protection for socially excluded children, particularly Roma children, to provide better support to impaired children, and establish a model for different types of care and non-institutional care for children, to put in place a mechanism to increase financial support to children (child allowance and other benefits for children, or families with children) and determine the social minimum sufficient to satisfy the basic needs of families with children.

With regard to special forms of child protection, measures should be continued more intensively with a view of protecting children from narcotic drugs, tobacco and alcohol abuse, as well as measures for prevention of violence against children, juvenile offences and improvement of alternative measures, continue the activities regarding the sale of children, child prostitution and pornography and educational and promotional activities aimed at raising awareness about the problems of vulnerable groups (Roma, refugees, asylum seekers, foreign citizens, children without escort, etc.)

Implementation of the activities with the poorest results achieved during the implementation of the previous Action Plan measures is a high priority, which pertained to financing – creating conditions for the realization of the plan, collection of data and other indicators, planning, education and creation of local resources.

V GOALS AND OBJECTIVES OF THE ACTION PLAN


Based on the presented assessment of the situation and the recommendations of the Committee for the Rights of the Child and recommendations of other international bodies, the Action Plan 2015–2018 proposed one Goal and eight Objectives.

GOAL

The realization of objectives and measures in the period from 2015 to 2018 in order to implement the Convention on the Rights of the Child, abiding by the recommendations of the Committee for the Rights of the Child and other international, UN, Council of Europe and other instruments for the protection of children rights, and the realization of the measures from the previous Action Plan that have not been implemented.

The goal contains **eight objectives** which pertain to the following:

- A Enhance the laws in BIH, policies, strategies, coordination and reporting with a view of strengthening the implementation of general measures entailing from the Convention of the Rights of the Child.
- B Improve the atmosphere for the implementation of the Convention of the Rights of the Child general principles related to non-discrimination, the best interest of child and respect of child's opinion.
- C Provide for the conditions for a full exercise of civil rights and freedom of children and set up specific mechanisms of rights and freedom protection.
- D Improve mechanisms of child protection and raise awareness in order to prevent and stop violence against children.
- E Strengthen capacities of family and society for social and health protection, education for the purpose of exercising the rights of children who are deprived of a family environment.
- F Provide for the mechanisms to improve the protection of rights of children with impairments and the overall protection of children and living standard.
- G Education and upbringing system will be made fair and available for the development of child/student potentials through high-quality, child-friendly and comprehensive services.
- H Provide for mechanisms of protection for vulnerable groups, especially children refugees, children migrants, children in street situations, children in conflict with the law and other children.



VI OBJECTIVES AND MEASURES

A) OBJECTIVE: Enhance the laws in BIH, policies, strategies, coordination and reporting with a view of enhancing the implementation of general measures entailing from the Convention of the Rights of the Child

a) General measures of the implementation
(Articles 4, 42 and 44 Paragraph 6 of the Convention on the Rights of the Child)

A 1. Enhancing the legal framework

In general, it can be noted that majority of laws in BIH is harmonized with the Convention. However, there is a lack of nation-level comprehensive legislation relative to the rights of the child which would provide for a full and direct influence of the Convention on the national legislation.

Considering a complex political and administrative organization of BIH (2 Entities, 10 Cantons and the District), the lack of such legislation results in the inconsistent exercising of children rights throughout the territory of BIH, and children's rights vary in similar situations depending on the area of their residence.

In addition to harmonization of laws with the BIH Anti-Discrimination, the following activities should be conducted: enhancing the criminal legislation, harmonizing laws relative to domestic violence, social protection and health of families with children, harmonizing laws relative to legal aid and also harmonizing the bylaws relative to the definition of a child.

With a view of enhancing the legal framework of Bosnia and Herzegovina, 11 measures are hereby proposed.

Measure 1	Draft the Initiative to enact a comprehensive Law on the Rights of the Child at the level of Bosnia and Herzegovina which would fully integrate the principles and provisions of the Convention and its Optional Protocols and give clear guidelines for its consistent implementation in the entire territory of BIH

Harmonization of laws in BIH with the Law on Prohibition of Discrimination of 2009 is inadequate and it resulted in a limited application in practice as observed in several registered civil actions on grounds of discrimination and a low public awareness of legal remedies available in cases of discrimination.

There were no other measures taken to systematically harmonize the legislation with the requirements of the Law on Prohibition of Discrimination.

A.1.1. Enhance the criminal legislation:

The existing criminal codes of the Entities and Brčko District should be harmonized with new international standards set forth within the Lanzarote Convention and the Convention on the Rights of the Child and its Optional Protocols. This explanation contains parts of recommendations and pertinent standards which should be used as a basis for harmonization of the existing criminal codes in BIH

Measure 3 Harmonization of legislation with Lanzarote Convention:

The existing BIH legal system on protection of children from sexual abuse and exploitation is not at the satisfactory level, especially in the domain of criminal law, and that is why it is necessary to start its harmonization with international standards, and its harmonization within the state itself.

Amendments to the criminal laws should go along the following lines:

Amendments to the Criminal Code of FBiH:

- The definition of child should be harmonized with the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child and Convention on Protection of Children from Sexual Exploitation and Sexual Abuse, and read that the child shall mean any person under the age of 18 years.
- Raise the age limit for a child's consent to sexual intercourse, to reach 16 years of age.
- No statute of limitations for criminal prosecution of offenses against sexual freedom and integrity committed to the detriment of a child.
- Tighten the sanction policy for criminal offenses against sexual freedom and morale, primarily when it comes to the minimum sentences.
- Introduce additional security measures that can be imposed on perpetrators of criminal offences (especially those that pertain to violence against children): mandatory treatment, psycho-social treatment of perpetrators, restraining order for certain person, removal from joint household, ban on carrying out the duty, office or function related to children.
- Revoke all limitations currently imposed by the law for certain vocations in terms of criminal responsibility for failure to report a criminal offense against sexual freedom and morale committed to the detriment of a child.
- Eliminate the possibility of amnesty and pardon in relation to perpetrators who are convicted under a final and binding verdict of the criminal offense of sexual violence against children.
- Determine the obligation to keep single records of perpetrators of sexual violence against children and enable the institutions and other legal entities whose business operations are

directly related to children to obtain/check the database against the candidates who apply for positions therein.

- Define the criminal offense of human trafficking in accordance with Palermo Protocol.

Amendments to the Criminal Code of RS:

- The definition of child should be harmonized with the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child and Convention on Protection of Children from Sexual Exploitation and Sexual Abuse, and read that a child shall mean any person under the age of 18 years.
- Raise the age limit for a child’s consent to sexual intercourse, to reach 16 years of age.
- Tighten the sanction policy for criminal offenses against sexual freedom and morale, primarily when it comes to the minimum sentences.
- Introduce additional security measures that can be imposed on perpetrators of criminal offences (especially those that pertain to violence against children) ban on carrying out the duty, office or function related to children.
- Revoke all limitations currently imposed by the law for certain vocations in terms of criminal responsibility for failure to report a criminal offense against sexual freedom and morale committed to the detriment of a child.
- Eliminate the possibility of amnesty and pardon in relation to perpetrators who are convicted under a final and binding verdict of the criminal offense of sexual violence against children.

Measure 4 Harmonization of criminal legislation with the recommendations of the Committee for the Rights of the Child:

- Submit the initiative for amendments to the existing criminal codes with a view of prohibiting the disclosure of personal details of children by the media and/or journalists and ensuring commensurate penalties for such conduct,
- Submit the initiative for amendments to the existing criminal codes with in order to explicitly prohibit corporal punishment in all settings, including the domestic context, throughout its territory,
- Submit the initiative for amendments to the existing criminal codes with a view of ensuring the effective pursuit of perpetrators of sexual abuse and exploitation of children, as well as assistance for and protection of victims and witnesses,
- Submit the initiative for amendments to the existing criminal codes with a view of explicitly criminalizing the violations of Optional Protocol on Recruitment and Involvement of Children in Armed Conflicts,

- Submit the initiative for amendments to the existing laws (statutory measures) to subject persons exploiting children through forced begging to criminal sanctions,
- Submit the initiative for amendments to the existing criminal codes with a view of ensuring commensurate sanctions for perpetrators of trafficking-related cases, particularly those involving child victims,
- Submit the initiative for amendments to the existing laws with a view of ensuring that the age of a victim never constitutes the sole grounds for invalidating his/her testimony,
- Submit the initiative for amendments to the existing Criminal Code of the Federation of BiH in order to criminalize the acts of human trafficking in accordance with Palermo Protocol.

A 1.3. Harmonization of the legislation on legal aid

Law on Exercising the Right to Free Legal Aid was enacted in Republika Srpska, Brčko District and 8 Cantons in the Federation of BiH (Tuzla, Posavina, Zenica-Doboj, West Herzegovina, Una-Sana, Bosnia Podrinje, Herzegovina-Neretva and Sarajevo Canton).

A 3.Coordination and reporting

With a view of executing the obligations of Bosnia and Herzegovina relative to the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child and its two Optional Protocols, the BIH Council for Children was established as an expert, intersectoral, counselling and coordinating body of BIH Council of Ministers. The Decision establishing the BIH Council for Children was adopted at the 30th session of BIH Council of Ministers held on 04 December 2012 while the decision appointing members of the Council for Children was adopted at the 67th session held on 6 November 2013.

RS Council for Children has been established and is operational in Republika Srpska. The establishment of such a body in the Federation of BIH would significantly enhance the coordination and reporting in the Federation of BIH particularly bearing in mind its complex structure.

A 4. Allocation of resources


Generally, a conclusion can be reached that there are gaps between the legislation and the implementation thereof, as well as insufficient budgets allocated for children.

Majority of these expenditures of the Entities' budgets are for war-related beneficiaries, resulting in insufficient funds for other persons in situations of vulnerability with similar or higher levels of need, including children and their families. There are significant substantial discrepancies in the availability of social assistance in the different territories of the State.

There are discrepancies in the area of social protection for children and their families in FBiH, with different levels of benefits in different cantons. The Law on Social Protection in FBiH prescribes that the Cantons shall further regulate and finance the rights and allowances for families with children. In view of discrepancies in the financial situation, some allowances are still not available to the beneficiaries, for example: child allowances are foreseen in five out of ten cantons, and the amount of the child allowance differs from one Canton to another (the lowest BAM 9.70, and the highest BAM 50).

Furthermore, the level of child allowance provided in the Republika Srpska was reduced.

A 5. Data collection

There is a clear lack of statistical data relating to the implementation of the Convention and clear division of responsibilities for collection, consolidation and analysis of data among different government bodies.

The DevInfo database does not incorporate any quality assurance process for verifying the reliability of its data.

With regard to the area of child protection at the level of BIH and Entities, there is still a lack of single system for collection of all necessary indicators for adequate monitoring of child rights, especially indicators of execution of international obligations assumed by BIH in different areas for the protection of child rights in BIH.

A 6. Independent monitoring

The Department for the Protection of Child Rights under the Human Rights Ombudsman of Bosnia and Herzegovina and the Ombudsman for Children in the Republika Srpska started working in mid-2009. The recommendations of these child rights mechanisms have not been implemented by the relevant authorities at the State, entity, district or cantonal levels, including the recommendations of the UN Committee for the Rights of the Child.

A 7. Awareness-raising

Based on the research conducted by NGOs, there is a limited awareness and working knowledge of the Convention among children. This is why the increased engagement of the State and its media in raising awareness about children’s rights and the Convention is necessary in a child-friendly manner, in particular through greater use of the press, radio, television, the Internet and other media, and the active involvement of children in public outreach activities.



A 8. Trainings

Some training and education activities on the Convention have been conducted by the State for its judiciary, law enforcement professionals and civil service, but the majority of the training provided are primarily delivered by non-governmental organizations (NGOs) supported by international donors. However, primary responsibility is questionable relative to providing adequate and systematic training and/or sensitization on children's rights for professional groups working with and for children, in particular law enforcement officials, as well as parliamentarians, judges, lawyers, health personnel, teachers, school administrators and others as required.

A 9. Cooperation with civil society

Improving co-operation with civil society, that is, statutory regulation of registration and operation of non-governmental organizations is provided for under the Law on Associations and Foundations of BIH and Entities and the laws regulating the financial sector. With regard to this area there is one novelty: the Council of Ministers of BIH concluded a general protocol on co-operation with non-governmental organizations. It is still necessary to continue developing a standardized approach in the improvement of co-operation and partnership with non-governmental organizations and promotion of statutory regulation for partnership with non-governmental organizations especially organizations that contributed a lot to promoting and advocating for better protection of children in BIH.

NGOs have a major role in the provision of child protection services in the State; they are dependent on foreign donors and remain subject to the same tax liabilities as private, profit-oriented entities, exacerbating the resource constraints they face.

A 10. Child rights and business sector

International human rights, environmental and other standards are not adequately monitored, protected and fulfilled to ensure that persons, including children, families and communities are not negatively affected by the private sector. That issues relating to the environmental and health impact of business activities are not addressed in a transparent manner that allows for informed public scrutiny and participation. UN Committee for the Rights of the Child issued a General Commentary No. 16 in 2013 about the state obligations regarding the influence of business sector on the rights of the child. The proposed measures should be observed in light of Resolution 8/7 and 17/4 of the Council for Human Rights which reads that the rights of the child should be taken into consideration when exploring the relation between business and human rights)

B) OBJECTIVE: Improve the environment for the implementation of general principles of the Convention on the Rights of the Child related to non-discrimination, the best interests of the child and recognition of the child's opinion

B General principles (Articles 2, 3, 6 and 12 of the Convention)

B 1. Non-discrimination

With a view of preventing racial discrimination, the Law on Prohibition of Discrimination (2009) and Revised Action Plan of BiH on the Educational Needs of Roma (2010) were adopted.

The State has not introduced a code of conduct regarding discrimination to prohibit stereotyped and stigmatizing portrayals of minority and/or ethnic groups in the media and to take measures to follow up on the Declaration and Program of Action adopted at the World Conference against Racism, Racial Discrimination, Xenophobia and Related Intolerance.

No follow-up measures were undertaken to raise the level of public awareness on the legal remedies available in cases of discrimination, including the development of information as to how to file a complaint to the Human Rights Ombudsman in Bosnia and Herzegovina, especially in educational and health institutions where children are frequently faced with discrimination.

Discrimination is still present in education, including the presence of the so-called "two schools under one roof" and mono-ethnic school policy in BiH where classes are divided on grounds of ethnic background.

Discrimination in the context of education continues to be prevalent, including with regard to the continued "two-schools-under-one-roof" and mono-ethnic schools policy in BiH, where classes are separated on the basis of ethnicity.


The Action Plan on the Educational Needs of Roma is not effectively implemented as a consequence of budget allocation limitations and that Roma children continue to have unequal access to education.

The annual report on the instances of discrimination in 2013 prepared by the Ombudsman for Human Rights in BiH, page 19 reads: "Bearing in mind the fact that there were violations of children's rights in the process of primary education, that a large number of children did not start attending classes in Konjević Polje by the end of first two semesters in the school year 2013/2014, that the positions of different sides are not yet changed, and that any attempt to mediate and find a solution in a dialogue did not yield any results, Ombudsman reached the decision to develop a special report on children's right to education in Bosnia and Herzegovina", but this report has not been developed.

On 30 October 2012, the Ministry of Human Rights and Refugees of BIH asked the Governments of the Entities and District to send their opinions as to how justified it is to conclude the Optional Protocol to the UN Convention for the Rights of the Child which pertains to the procedure upon complaints.

On 11 March 2013, the Government of the Federation of BIH gave its approval for conclusion of this international treaty and Brčko District gave its approval on 18 February 2014.

The Government of Republika Srpska did not submit its opinion even after the reiterated request of the Ministry of Human Rights and Refugees.

Also, on the occasion of 25th anniversary of the Convention on the Rights of the Child, the network "Snažniji glas za djecu" started advocating for signature and ratification of the said Protocol.


B 2. Best interest of the child

The principle of the best interest of the child is not adequately applied in situations concerning children deprived of a family environment. In particular, the best interests of the child are not the primary consideration when regulating and implementing the placement of children deprived of a family environment into different forms of alternative care, including institutions.

The principle of the best interests of the child is widely known and should be appropriately integrated and consistently applied in all legislative, administrative and judicial proceedings and all policies, programs and projects relevant to and with an impact on children, particularly those deprived of a family environment.

In 2013, the UN Committee for the Rights of the Child enacted the General Commentary 14 to pay particular attention to ensuring primacy of the principle of the best interests of the child, and to disseminate them to public and private social welfare institutions, courts of law, administrative authorities and legislative bodies at the national, entities' and local levels.

The General Commentary must be translated and also provided in a child-friendly language version (so that children can understand it). Furthermore, it should be integrated into education plans and programs for professionals.

B 3. Respect for the views of the child

The legislation, including family laws and other relevant legislation, recognizes the right of children to express their views in relevant legal proceedings. The State initiated the Enhancing the Social Protection and Inclusion System for Children program in 2009 to support the introduction and improvement of children's participation at the community level. However, actual implementation of legislation recognizing the rights of children to express their views in decisions affecting them, including relevant legal proceedings, is rarely undertaken and is not systematically monitored by social workers and courts.

C. Civil rights and freedoms

(Articles 7, 8, 13-17, 19 and 37 (a) of the Convention)

C1. Birth registration

Although the Law on Birth Registration is adopted in Republika Srpska in October 2009 and in Federation of Bosnia and Herzegovina in July 2011, the State has not yet established a free and universal birth registration system, which results in difficulties in birth registration for children born outside of hospitals, children living in remote areas, refugees and children belonging to minority groups. More specifically:

- Inadequate accessibility of registration offices in rural and outlying areas;
- Birth registration not being free of charge for births occurring outside hospitals;
- Difficulties encountered by families belonging to ethnic minorities, particularly those of Roma ethnicity, due to the lack of translation and interpretation services;
- Birth registration being subject to the immigration status of the child's parents, resulting in particular disadvantage to the Roma community, which has markedly lower rates of parents possessing the necessary documentation; and
- The lack of public awareness of the importance of birth registration, particularly among the Roma population.

C2. Right to privacy

There have been cases of frequent instances of unethical and unprofessional conduct by journalists publishing personal details of children and youth who are victims or perpetrators of offences. There is no national legislation prohibiting the disclosure of personal details of children by the media and/or journalists and ensuring commensurate penalties for such conduct. There are no child-specific and child-friendly mechanisms for children to complain against breaches of their privacy, and to increase the protection of children involved in penal proceedings. Also, there is a need to increase the protection of children who are involved in criminal proceedings. Furthermore, there is also a lack of organized campaigns to raise awareness of the Convention and the right of the child to privacy among journalists and other media professionals.

D. Violence against children

D 1. Corporal punishment

Corporal punishment is unlawful in schools and as a sentence for crime and disciplinary measure in penal institutions throughout the State but corporal punishment in the home remains widespread in the State.

Considering that the explicit prohibition of corporal punishment in all settings, including the domestic context, throughout its territory is not in place, objective A contains this measure singled out as a specific measure.

However, there is a wide acceptance of a certain degree of violence in “disciplining” children and therefore it is necessary to strengthen and expand awareness-raising and education programs, including campaigns, in order to promote positive and alternative forms of discipline and respect for children’s rights with the involvement of children, while raising awareness about the adverse consequences of corporal punishment.

D 2. Abuse and neglect

There is a lack of harmonized legislation on domestic violence across the State which constitutes a significant obstacle in ensuring the prevention and punishment of all forms of violence against children. Besides that, that the lack of a national database on domestic violence against children also prevents a comprehensive assessment of the extent, causes and nature of this phenomenon. The measures to disseminate information about the impact of domestic violence on children and measures to encourage reporting of instances of child abuse remain inadequate.

D 3. Sexual exploitation and abuse

The finances are insufficient for the implementation of the Action Plan for improving the system of protection against child pornography and other forms of sexual exploitation and sexual abuse of children through information and communication technologies in Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Furthermore, there is the lack of a framework for cross-border cooperation for the prosecution of perpetrators, as well as assistance for and protection of victims and witnesses. Also, the type and length of sentences for sexual exploitation and sexual abuse in the Criminal Codes at both the State and entity/District levels are frequently not commensurate.

E. Family environment and alternative care

E 1. Family environment

2008 Program for Enhancing the Social Protection and Inclusion System for Children (SPIS) is basically positive step forward, but the limited financial and human resources have been made available to Social Work Centers. This has resulted in the centers being unable to prevent the dissolution of families in cases where an alternative situation could have been adopted, and address the needs of children deprived of parental care. The Centers do not have clear terms of reference focused on the provision of social support, and therefore frequently focus mostly on administrative work relating to the registration of beneficiaries and the evaluation of formal legal criteria for the realization of the right to social assistance rather than on the provision of support to families.

Social Work Centers have not so far sufficiently used new and efficient methods of social inclusion of marginalized children that were developed by non-governmental organizations.

Given the said circumstances, the Centers need to co-operate with civil society organizations so that they can jointly enhance the conditions for the development of healthy potentials of children.

E 2. Children deprived of family environment

The Policy for the Protection of Children without Parental Care and Families at Risk of Separation in the Federation of Bosnia and Herzegovina (2006-2016) was adopted.

However, children are being placed in institutions on the sole basis of family economic hardship and the following:

- The inadequacy of alternative family- and community-based options for children deprived of a family environment or children with special protection needs, with the majority of children being placed in institutions; and insufficient efforts being made to reunite such children with their biological families, resulting in many of those children remaining in institutions until the age of 18;
- Children placed in institutions located outside of the territory of their registered residence and therefore unable to access health care due to administrative obstacles relating to their relocation;
- Understaffing in centers for social work, resulting in children in institutions having insufficient attention paid to their development;
- The absence of a comprehensive system of foster care, and the low and irregular funds for covering the costs of children's placement in foster families, frequently resulting in low standards of care in such situations;
- Inadequate preparation and support for children and youth leaving the public care system; and
- The current system of alternative care discouraging the reunification of children with their biological families even where this may be a viable option.

E 3. Adoption

There are discrepancies in the legislation among the entities and territories in the State, resulting in legislative ambiguity and protection gaps, especially because of the following;

- Low adoption rates due to complex and time-consuming procedures for adoption; the lack of coordination among social protection institutions; and the absence of a database on children eligible for adoption and corresponding applications from prospective adopters;
- The upper age limit of five years for children in the Republika Srpska, resulting in most children there not being eligible for adoption; and
- lack of the data disaggregated according to, inter alia, age, gender, socioeconomic status, on children involved in domestic and intercountry adoption.

F) OBJECTIVE: Provide for mechanisms of protection of the rights of children with disabilities and overall protection of children and living standard

F. Disability, basic health and welfare

(Articles 6, 18 (sub-paragraph 3), 23, 24, 26, 27 (Paragraphs 1-3) of the Convention)

F 1. Children with disabilities

The Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) was ratified in 2010. However, no concrete steps have been taken to establish a clear legislative definition of disability and ensure the alignment of national, entity and cantonal legislation with the provisions of that Convention.

Inclusive education remains severely limited, with the teachers lacking competence to work with children with disabilities and rarely any teaching assistants for individual work with children, resulting with the majority of children with disabilities staying at home or being segregated in special institutions/schools, and stigmatization and compromised access to employment opportunities and social services.

Insufficient and inadequate care and support, with service providers, in particular centers for social work and health-care centers, not being adequately equipped and prepared to provide services and support necessary for addressing the needs of children with disabilities while allowing them to continue living with their families. The application of legal provisions on construction is inadequate resulting in the persistence of architectural and physical barriers in public areas, including schools. The disparity between the protections afforded to persons with war-related disabilities and persons with disabilities resulting from an accident, illness or existing since birth, in particular children, results in unequal and lesser protection being provided to the latter.

F.2. Health and health services

The complex political structure and lack of unified laws and policies make equal access to health care for all children difficult.

Despite the 2010 Law on Health Care of the Federation of Bosnia and Herzegovina, which is aimed at regulating the health protection of national minorities, a large proportion of the Roma population remains deprived of health insurance. Immunization rates in the period 2005–2011 declined and coverage is significantly lower for vulnerable groups, with only 40 per cent of Roma children being fully immunized. The rates of iron-deficiency anemia remain high among children and pregnant and lactating women. Baby-friendly practices in hospitals are inadequate, with low rates of early initiation of breastfeeding, and less than 20 per cent of all children under the age of 6 months being exclusively breastfed. The International Code of Marketing of Breast-milk Substitutes is not enforced at the State level and there is no systematic monitoring mechanism in place, which results in widespread violation of the Code.

F 3. Adolescent health

Alcohol, tobacco and illegal drug consumption remains widespread among adolescents in the State, yet there is no systematic data collection on the consumption of alcohol, tobacco and drugs and no measures are taken to efficiently implement the sale ban of such products to children.

Furthermore, the lack of preventive measures is observed amongst adolescents in the community which would strengthen protective factors and develop skills of adolescents for healthy life in the community.

F 4. Social protection

There are differences in the area of social protection of children and families in FBiH where benefits levels vary from canton to canton. The Law on Social Protection in the Federation of BiH prescribes that the Cantons are in charge of further regulation and financing of the rights and benefits for families with children. The differences in public financial situation are the reason for which some benefits are still unavailable to beneficiaries, for example, the child allowance is prescribed in five out of ten cantons. The amount of child allowance differs per Cantons (the lowest being BAM 9.70, the highest BAM 50.00).

The child protection in the RS is financed at the central level and implemented through the Public Fund for Child Protection. For example, the total number of minor beneficiaries of social protection in the RS in 2007 was 87,925. The structure of beneficiaries as per main child categories shows that the most represented is the category of children at risk due to family situation (44.2%) and children in socio-protection need (41.6%). Furthermore, the beneficiaries' structure include children without specific category 6.1%, children with mental and physical impairments 4.6%, and significantly lower percentage of children with socially unacceptable behavior 3.3% and mentally ill children 0.2%.

In addition to the child allowance (BAM 35), and allowance for second and third child in family, the Public Fund also pays funds for particularly vulnerable children which in 2010 amounted to BAM 100.00.

Due to economic crisis, the RS authorities decreased the amount of child allowance paid out of the Public Fund for Child Protection. Child allowance for the second child is BAM 35.00, for the third child BAM 70.00, the fourth child BAM 35.00, and BAM 90.00 for vulnerable category of children, equipment of newborn first and second child BAM 350.00, for the third child BAM 500.00 KM and the fourth child BAM 400.00.

The new Law on Social Protection was adopted in the RS in 2012 ("Official Gazette RS" Vol. 37/12) and it foresees the increase in all monetary allowances for end beneficiaries including children. The monetary aid and allowance for aid and care of another person is provided in as much as 50% of funds are provided from the RS budget and 50% from local self-governance units' budget.

Children have a direct right to benefit from social security, including social insurance. Nevertheless, this right appears to be limited to children only up to the age of 15.

A large proportion of children in the state live under the established poverty line, resulting in housing, amenities, health and education deprivations that seriously limit the fulfilment of their rights with the exercise of their rights. The current social welfare system does not adequately address the needs of persons in situations that are most financially disadvantaged.

The activities aimed at identification of problem and monitoring the situation in the area of social protection are of special importance for children in Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Standard of living

Notwithstanding certain progress in terms of economic growth in the past decade, according to UNICEF data, a child poverty rate in 2010 was 26.6%, and the global economic crisis has a significant impact on the living standard. Furthermore, rural families, Roma, internally displaced persons, returnees, families with two or more children and families with children with invalids make a large part of socially vulnerable population.


Revised Strategy for the Implementation of Annex VII of the Dayton Peace Agreement, which sets out measures for strengthening access to rights for internally displaced persons (IDPs) and returnee children is adopted. However, inadequacies in living conditions persist for Roma and minority returnee children and internally displaced children living in collective centers that continue to exist.

Asylum-seeking, internally displaced and returnee children are not guaranteed access to adequate health care, with entitlements only to “basic” health care, which is not defined by law and frequently insufficient; and many rural health-care facilities have been destroyed or are unequipped, resulting in rural returnees having no access to health care locally;

Minority returnees, including those of Roma ethnicity, and IDPs frequently experience difficulties in covering the costs relating to education, such as school supplies and travel costs, and

The State party does not provide legal aid for IDPs, minority returnees, refugees, asylum seekers and people at risk of statelessness.

H 3. Economic exploitation and children in street situations

Begging is one of the main forms of exploitation of children. While some measures have been taken at the local level, there is no systematic approach to address this issue.

Forced child begging is not recognized as a form of trafficking in the State party's Criminal Code

There is no coordinated framework for intersectoral cooperation in addressing the issue of economic exploitation, including forced begging.

There are inadequate day-care and/or social centers for the protection, recovery and reintegration of children in street situations.

6 7. The Committee recommends that the state party should:

- (a) continue strengthening the campaign to raise awareness about mines and mine clearance activities, particularly by strengthening mine clearance funding as carried out by the Armed Forces of Bosnia and Herzegovina;
- (b) consider establishing special rehabilitation programs for children affected by mines and other consequences of armed conflict, and ensure that all affected children can access such programs, including through increased allocation of resources to centers for social work and increased coverage of the personal disability allowance system; and
- (c) establish a procedure for adequate identification and referral of all children who have been involved in armed conflict so that they can receive appropriate help, in accordance with Article 6(3) of the Optional Protocol.

H 4. Sale, trafficking and abduction

National Action to Combat Trafficking in Human Beings (2008-2012) has been adopted. However, there are significant discrepancies between the number of trafficking-related incidents reported by the police and the number of investigations ordered by the prosecutors as a result thereof.

Courts at all levels have not issued commensurate sanctions for trafficking-related cases, including in those involving child victims.

There have been cases where the testimony of a child victim was deemed inadequate in the establishment of the guilt of the perpetrator.

There have been reports of girls, particularly those of Roma ethnicity, being trafficked for forced marriage and/or involuntary domestic servitude.

H 5. Administration of juvenile justice

The new Law on the Protection and Treatment of Children and Juveniles in Contact with the Law was adopted in Republika Srpska in 2010, in Brčko District in 2011 and in Federation of BiH in 2104.

The Law on the Protection and Treatment of Children and Juveniles in Contact with the Law is based on one of fundamental principles, which is that the reaction to juvenile offenses should move from more lenient to stricter sentences , primarily using out-of-court models and more lenient formal reactions of prosecutors and police and use the criminal sanctions as last measure.

The Law prescribes that the application of international standards and execution of the State obligations to apply alternative models, the so-called diversion prompts juvenile offenders to assume responsibility for what they did and understand the meaning of unacceptable behavior and so to return into society as a useful member after correction. This is now possible through a newly-introduced institute of police warning and upbringing recommendations applying the principle of opportunity.

Diversion from regular procedure prescribes the prosecutor’s obligation to apply the principles and rules prescribed by the law and by-laws in view of not approaching the formal criminal proceedings before trying to resolve the case of juvenile offense by upbringing recommendations.

A minor is entitled to the rights which shall be respected at all stages of the criminal proceedings, such as the right to be clearly informed of the charges, that s/he is considered innocent until proven otherwise.

The introduction of new and amended existing provisions, entailed new competences of the fostering body, police, prosecutor’s office, court and competent ministries in BiH.


One important novelty is a special chapter in the law titled “Criminal offense to the detriment of children and minors” and extensively prescribed procedure for their interrogation.

The execution of correctional measures and juvenile prison is based on an individual approach to minor which is adapted to his/her personality and in accordance with modern achievements of science, pedagogy and penology practice.

However, despite the new legal framework regulating the administration of juvenile justice in BiH which is harmonized with international standards, there is still a concerning fact that BiH does not have comprehensive analytical and statistical data on children in conflict with law due to different criteria in the data collection systems in two Entities and Brčko District of BiH wherefore a better understanding of juvenile justice administration is impossible.
